It is my honor to introduce this year's ADRP Volunteer Service Award recipient, Kimberly Arndts.

There are few of us—even given the throng of donor relations professionals in the room! —who can genuinely check ego at the door and enter a conversation fully present and ready to listen. Kim is among the few.

Kim is the quintessential “servant leader,” a term reserved for leaders who put others above themselves. A member of ADRP since 2013 and an inaugural member of ADRP's Research Committee founded in 2019, Kim now co-chairs the committee.
