





CELEBRATING DONOR MILESTONES


Here's two ways we are doing it at Rutgers

MILESTONE REPORT BOOKS

- 20 page book dedicated to the celebration of the donor's milestone and their impact on the university
- Donors must have given more than \$1M cumulative lifetime giving (gifts and pledges) and are currently being managed-stewarded or cultivated.
- Some sample content of what has been included in milestone report books:

TEPPER FAMILY ENDOWMENT AND SUPPORT FOR SCHOLARSHIPS/FINANCIAL AID

The Tepper Family Endowment, which was first used in the 2009-2010 academic year for financial assistance to students enrolled in the School of Arts and Sciences Honors Program, has provided financial aid to more than 100 students at Rutgers. We caught up with two former recipients of aid from the Tepper Family Endowment and proud Rutgers alumnae, Ashley Sawyer and Karin Zahavi.

Ashley Sawyer credits the influence of her family, her experiences at Rutgers, and her first full-time job after graduating as the inspirations behind her decision to study law and become an advocate for social change. As a student at Douglass Residential College, she worked with student organizations in behalf of people living with HIV/AIDS and helped organize events aimed at raising awareness of gender-based violence, educational inequality, and racial injustice.

A member of the New York Bar, Sawyer is now a law fellow at the Education Law Center in Philadelphia, where she provides policy advocacy around the general and special education needs of youth who are in the juvenile justice system. In addition, she has taken part in national and local panel discussions on the education and mental health needs of children who are incarcerated, and made presentations at the American Public Health Association annual meeting in Chicago, the National Legal Aid and Defender Association conference in New Orleans, and the Free Minds, Free People conference in Oakland, California.

Looking back to her time at Rutgers, Sawyer appreciates the scholarship she received from the Tepper Family Endowment. "Any financial support offered to undergraduate students has a significant impact; it tells you there are people who believe in you ... I am incredibly grateful for the Tepper funding and I sincerely appreciate the support that I received."

- Data "go to" person to compile and research donor and gift milestones
- Admin support to create research file for writer
- University archives and libraries
- PM: Engaged before, during and after and to help establish donor priorities and customization
- Communications-create template, then suggest vendors when the template is too complex
- Team Centered approach within Donor Relations

- Changes we have incorporated to our process:

 - stock photography is not a bad thing
 - combining couples when possible

DONORS CELEBRATING MILESTONE REUNIONS

 Donors of \$500K plus cumulative lifetime celebrating reunions receive a customized, hand signed letter from the University President



OTHER IDEAS

- Handwritten notes, emails, or calls from leadership
- Visits from leadership
- Visits to organization to witness firsthand the impact of their gift
- Photobooks, photos, framed prints, faculty books
- Brief one-page reports to longer, in-depth impact reports
- Newspaper ad (yes, newspaper!)
- Send cookies, balloons, fruit baskets, wine, cheese
- Student art
- Use <u>www.touchnotes.com</u> or <u>https://sincerely.com/postagram</u> to turn a photo into postcard
- Social Media shout outs, video messages
- Yearbook photos





RECOGNIZE ...

- the date donor received their admittance letter to the school
- the date donor received a varsity letter
- the date donor was released from the hospital
- the date donor's endowed fund started
- consecutive years of giving
- reaching milestone dollar levels (\$100,000, etc.)
- reaching a milestone number of scholarship/fellowship recipients
- reaching a milestone number of areas supported within an organization
- the years a donor has been cancer-free
- the anniversary of a building's opening
- birthdays, weddings, wedding anniversaries, promotions
- the first time they came back to campus for an event after graduating (if you know the date)
- Milestones that have nothing to do with the organization ... like the 10th anniversary of serving on the board of another organization!

WHY WE SHOULD ACKNOWLEDGE MILESTONES

- Reminds our DONORS that what they have done by making a gift is incredible.
- It keeps a focus on the positive.
- Reminds our DONORS that they have not been forgotten.
- Assists in cultivating a sense of community.
- Creates more memories.
- Takes inventory.
- Charts the course for the next gift.



When we pause to acknowledge something that is noteworthy, the act of pausing invites us to notice everything else.
