
MORE THAN 125 LECTURES, DEBATES AND SEMINARS IN THE PAST SIX YEARS


THE RENOVATED PEACE GARDEN

On August 26, 2016, the Chapel of St. Thomas Aquinas' renovated Peace Garden, originally created in 1994, opened for use, thanks to your generosity. The renovation created an open and welcoming semi-private space for prayer, thought and reflection. 
SAMANTHA JONES '15


