

Domenic Broccoli, the IHOP kingpin of the Bronx, lives a good life. He drives a nice car, spends time with his six grandkids, and golfs often enough to have a tan for most of the year.

He owns a four-bedroom home in Pelham Manor, a house upstate, and IHOPs throughout the borough where he grew up, each of which runs smoothly enough to give Broccoli the time and resources to devote himself, at the age of 66, to the animating force in his life: destroying his enemies.

This mission came as a surprise to Broccoli, who had little reason to expect that trying to expand his pancake empire into upstate New York — and to build his grandest IHOP yet — would lead to such conflict. But sometimes that's what happens when you find a dead body.




There would have been no church at Gleniffer if it had not been for a Christmas pudding.



PIPELINE INFRASTRUCTURE TO A **MARGINALIZED COMMUNITY**

BAO THUAN, **VIETNAM**



Flooding, pollution, competition for water during the dry season, and contaminants contribute to deterioration in clean water supplies in Vietnam. This global grant established pipeline infrastructure to transport clean, safe water to 1,500 people living in Bao Thuan Village in the Lam Dong Province.

Residents of the area rely on agriculture for their livelihoods. Children often bear the burden of walking miles each day to find water in contaminated ponds. Sickness and the time lost fetching it robs people in the community of their futures. The new pipeline provided a lifeline to a reliable supply of quality water that is instilling hope and strengthening physical and economic wellbeing.

NEW:

- The lives of 1,500 people in the Lam Dong Province of Vietnam were transformed by a Rotary global grant. In the village of Bao Thuan, water shortages affect all the residents' lives even the children's.
- A variety of factors contribute to shortages: Flooding, competition for water during the dry season, and contaminants. Children often bear the burden of walking miles each day to find water in contaminated ponds. Sickness and the time lost in fetching water robs people in the community of their futures.
- The Rotary grant funded a new pipeline to provide a reliable supply of quality water. The pipeline is giving the villagers hope and strengthening their physical and economic wellbeing.

ANTIGUA EDUCATION TRAINING

ST. JOHN'S, ANTIGUA



The goal of this global grant project was to improve access to quality education for students in primary schools and women in Antigua, one of the two major islands that make up the Caribbean nation of Antigua and Barbuda. Building on previous initiatives, this project brought approximately 500 computers and more than a dozen Wi-Fi networks to primary schools, training to teachers, and a sewing center to communities in need.

With limited resources, the Antigua Ministry of Education prioritizes technological support in secondary schools. Reliable internet access allows the primary students to achieve digital literacy necessary for success in and after secondary school. Equipped with the training they need to support their students, teachers can effectively advance student progress. Access to sewing training and resources also means more women can build entrepreneurial skills that allow them to improve their financial stability. The project has benefited 2,500 people.

NEW:

- <u>From computers to sewing machines</u>, Rotary provided a range of technologies to schools in Antigua. The Antigua Ministry of Education prioritizes technological support in secondary schools, but has limited resources.
- Building on previous initiatives, this project brought approximately 500 computers and more than a dozen Wi-Fi networks to primary schools, as well as teacher training and a sewing center. The project has benefited 2,500 people.
- Reliable internet access allows students to achieve the digital literacy necessary for success in and after secondary school. <u>Access to sewing training and resources also means more women can build entrepreneurial skills</u> and improve their financial stability.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CENTER

KANSAS, UNITED STATES



This global grant helped to establish a drop-in center for victims of human trafficking and domestic violence in a central area of Topeka, Kansas, USA. The center supports their psychosocial needs and assists them with basic needs in a safe environment. It also serves as an entry point for longer-term community support services.

People most in need of the support range in age from 18 to 66 years; 92 percent are female and eight percent are male. Clients overwhelmingly utilize the center as a place of respite, as well as a place to make a meal and do laundry. Staff check in with each client and provide case management for those with identified goals that can be supported by the center's advocates. The center also hosted gatherings to provide self-care items that support clients' emotional well-being. Many have expressed gratitude about the support, respect, and dignity they receive when they turn to the center for help.

NEW:
