University Raised \$15.6 Million in FY 07

It gives me great pleasure to tell you about the exceptionally successful 2007 fiscal year at the University of Hartford.

Thanks to your generosity, there was a significant increase in contributions. The amount raised was \$15.6 million, 13.9% over the prior year and 39.2% over the year before. More than 8,700 alumni, faculty, staff, and friends participated.

Those of you who frequent the campus have surely taken note of the stunning recent additions, including Hawk Hall, our five-story, 208-bed residence for first-year students; athletics fields; and the Renée Samuels Center at the Hartford Art School. Exciting projects taking shape include the Mort and Irma Handel Performing Arts Center and the University High School of Science and Engineering. Yet what is not as visible is what has been at our core since the University's founding a half-century ago: transforming the lives of students.

As we come to the end of our yearlong celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the University, we look forward to continuing success and maintaining the personal attention and high-quality standards that are the hallmark of a University of Hartford education.

We are grateful for your loyalty and your generous support of the University of Hartford.



President Harrison's Message to the Future

(Time Capsule Letter from President Harrison to future students, faculty and staff of the University in 2057- October 19, 2007)



To the students, faculty, staff, and friends of the University in 2057: I send you greetings from 2007 on the 100th anniversary of the University of Hartford. While I will not be with you for this very joyous occasion, I am sure many of our current students will be active and loyal alumni, and many of our current faculty and staff will be among you to celebrate how the University has grown and changed since this beautiful autumn day in 2007, as I write this letter. They'll be able to reflect on my descriptions of our world and the University, and will be able to tell you much more clearly than I can what the world was like here in the first decade of the 21st century.

We live in a dynamic, exciting, and increasingly challenging world in 2007. Technology has changed our world rapidly, but I trust what we think of as technological marvels (cell phones, flat screen televisions, wireless laptop computers, and the like) will seem almost prehistoric by your standards. We sense that technology has made our world smaller, and aided greatly in its development. We are increasingly aware that we live in a world where national borders are less important, where we see ourselves more connected and more dependent on each other. At the same time, we in the United States are bogged down in an unpopular war in Iraq and engaged with growing fundamentalism and terrorism all over the world. I believe this fundamentalism to be a backlash against faster and faster progress made possible by technology, but I am optimistic that by 2057 the world will be a better and more peaceful place—and even more internationally connected. You may be the judge of that. In 2007 we in the United States live at a time when a growing understanding of the differences between people is breaking down the last barriers of prejudice based on race, religion, ethnicity, and sexual orientation. We are learning to celebrate and learn from each other. Both these trends—growing international awareness and the celebration of the diversity of human beings—are important characteristics of the University of Hartford in 2007. We have a student body of 7,308 and a faculty and staff of about 1,500. Our students come from almost all of the 50 states and 60 different countries. About 25% of our student body is people of color, and about 4% is international. About 30% of our student body is Jewish. Our student body is now about half men and half women, although the percentage of women in the student body here and nationally has increased dramatically over the past decade or two.

We are very proud in 2007 of the dynamic growth and intellectual energy of the University. The Hartt School and the Hartford Art School vibrate with the energy of the performing and visual arts and stand geographically and creatively at the center of our University. The College of Engineering, Technology, and Architecture is catapulting the University forward as a center of science, engineering, and related disciplines. The liberal arts flourish in the College of Arts and Sciences and Hillyer College, as they have since our founding, and the professional schools—the Barney School of Business and the College of Education, Nursing and Health Professions—continue to prepare students for leadership in both the private and not-for-profit sectors. We are a vibrant residential university (about 3,700 students live on campus), and as we bury this capsule we also dedicate our newest residence hall, Hawk Hall, just to its east. We think Hawk Hall is the finest residence hall we have ever built, and Alumni Plaza, under which this time capsule sits, will become the center for first-year student life on campus. Were we right? We love our wooded campus with the Hog River running gently (usually gently) through it. We are proud of our athletic teams, and during these years in the early part of the 21st century, our women's basketball team has emerged as a powerhouse among universities our size. We have recently opened new athletic fields for soccer, lacrosse, softball, and baseball. How have they held up—if at all?

In this decade we have opened two magnet schools—the University of Hartford Magnet School and the University High School of Science and Engineering. We are, in 2007, the only private university with two public schools on its campus. We're very proud of that, and see these schools as symbols of the University's vital connection with the Greater Hartford community. We are proud to be a private university with a public purpose. We feel that we have come a long way since the University's founding in 1957.

We have spent this year celebrating the University's fiftieth anniversary, and we are sure you will be celebrating the 100th anniversary just as joyfully. As we look back on our first fifty years, we see how much we have grown and changed. You will look over what we see as the next fifty years with the same sense of wonder. I hope what is great about the University—our intellectual excitement and the wonderful spirit of our faculty, staff, students, and alumni—continues to distinguish it, just as I hope the energy and creativity of those who come after us change and improve what we have done.

We have placed in this time capsule items that we feel represent the life of the University in 2007. We hope you find these interesting manifestations of what life was like in 2007. I personally hope you find some of them amusing and primitive! That will mean that the world will have changed for the better.

I hope the University will continue to be distinguished by a sense of freedom and justice for all of humankind, and I hope some of our great traditions—like painting the anchor and gathering on the campus green for Commencement—will continue to thrive. Mostly, I hope and trust that all of you will have made this great university an even better place to learn and live.

University Celebrates Its 50th Commencement—Sunday, May 20, 2007

"Remember, there are those who make things happen, those who watch what happens, and those who ask, what happened? What do you want to be?" **Liane Hansen**, host of National Public Radio's award-winning Weekend Edition Sunday and a University of Hartford alumna, posed that question to the nearly 1,400 members of the Class of 2007 at the University's 50th annual Commencement. Hansen, who attended the University of Hartford from 1969 to



1971, said, "I consider my beginning in radio to be here," as she hung around WWUH-FM while her friends did their shifts. "Many of the things I learned then still resonate in my life today."



In celebration of the University's 50th anniversary, eight members of the Class of 1957, dressed in gold robes, attended the ceremony and at least one member from each of the Univer-

sity's 50 graduating classes took part in the Commencement procession. The procession also included graduates of the University's founding schools going back as far as 1945. "Today we celebrate all of the University's graduates -- from 1945 to 1957 to 2007," said University President Walter Harrison.



Messages from the Deans

College of Arts and Sciences Interim Dean Harry Workman

Fiscal year '07 brought a change to the dean's office. Joseph Voelker became the interim provost when former Provost, Donna Randall, left the University to become president of Albion College. As a result, Harry Workman was selected to be the interim dean. Harry is a chemistry professor and was heavily involved in the ISET planning and construction. Two exciting things happened in FY '07. One was the unanimous approval of a BA in Mathematics with Secondary Education Certification from the Connecticut State Department of Education and the Connecticut Department of Higher Education. This is a program jointly offered by the Mathematics Department in A&S and ENHP. The aim of the program is to develop highly skilled mathematics teachers and satisfy a crucial need in secondary education. The second was an evaluation of the School of Communication program. The revised program is consistent with some of the most respected communication programs and reflects recent developments in teaching and learning. In Fiscal Year '08, we look to increase our strengths in faculty advising. A&S was awarded a University grant to improve the Dialogue Advising experience. The goal is to provide more support for new advisors and to provide new approaches to advising for the seasoned advisors.

The Hartt School had a banner year in terms of both promise and achievement. Our major news is the announcement of the construction kick-off for the Mort and Irma Handel Performing Arts Center; at this writing the project is already underway. It will provide new studios and performing spaces as well as facilities for community activities. We were delighted to hear of Sergey Antonov's success. Antonov, is a Russian born cellist who recently completed his first year of graduate study at The Hartt School and was awarded first prize in the cello category of the 13th International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, a stellar achievement of truly international importance. This year saw the greatest number of applications in the history of the school. Besides the obvious talent of our applicants and students in their artistic discipline, they continue to beat the national average in SAT scores and represent the highest verbal and math scores for a college within the University.



The school continues its ambitious and energetic performance calendar offering many opportunities for our students to practice their skills before an increasing audience of supporters.

Hartford Art School Dean Power Boothe



Since our founding in 1877, our mission has been steadfast: "To develop successful practicing artists and designers." The Hartford Art School embraces both continuity and change: we are committed to exploring the innovative possibilities of digital technology and in the engaged, hands-on, intimate nature of all art making. As we move into the 21st Century and address the creative prospects of digital technology, our new Renée Samuels Center provides state-of-the art digital equipment and studios specifically designed for Media Arts and Photography. We have also renovated painting, drawing, printmaking, and foundation studios to improve our ability to teach disciplines that are more traditional that continue to flourish in our time. Our distinguished faculty of artists and designers believe in one-on one mentoring across all disciplines; they set high standards for aesthetic development and intellectual growth. We offer a Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) degree in nine majors and two Masters of Fine Arts (MFA) degrees.

We believe that every student arrives with unique gifts and abilities. We believe artists and designers reveal and transform their times and our job is to help make transparent a challenging, dynamic, creative process that will assist each in the development of his or her unique voice.

Hillyer College Dean David Goldenberg AA '73, BS '76, MED '76



Data from the National Survey on Student Engagement indicated that Hillyer College students were hard at work writing more papers than other students from across the nation. There were many other areas of the study that indicated our students were doing more than their peers from coast to coast. We interpreted this information as an affirmation of our goal to challenge students to rise to their true potential. The relationship between our faculty and students was epitomized by our participation in the Preceptor program. Former Hillyer graduates came back to assist faculty in freshman classes. While we are well known as a college that focuses on teaching and learning, we had the great pleasure this past year of seeing the works of our faculty recognized nationally and internationally. New books about the exploration of the arctic, and the relationship between Winston Churchill and Dwight Eisenhower were just two among many. But we were particularly pleased to see one of our faculty interviewed on national election night on MSNBC.

Finally, a special thanks to all the alumni, parents, and friends of the College who donated to our \$1,000,000 endowment campaign. We closed out our campaign with \$1,130,000. These funds increased scholarships for students and created several endowment funds to support faculty development.

Barney School of Business Dean Jim Fairfield-Sonn



Fiscal Year '07 was a productive and exciting year for the Barney School of Business on many fronts. We were fortunate to hire several talented individuals to join our faculty. In addition, we hired a seasoned business executive to help provide cutting-edge insights into current accounting practices. We made several enhancements to our program offerings. We provided more opportunities for students to participate in short-term international academic experiences in Berlin, Crete, Paris, and Singapore. We introduced Preceptors, accomplished Barney School juniors and seniors, to mentor our incoming freshman in our signature BAR 110 fall freshman-only course. We installed an information kiosk in the International Foyer, and a telecast monitor on the third floor of Auerbach Hall to provide live information on stock market developments. This year, we were listed in *Princeton Review's* "282 Best Business Schools in the World". Our *Beta Gamma Sigma* chapter was honored to be one of only six schools in the northeast to be designated as a premier chapter. Dr. Farhad Rassekh, professor of Economics, won the prestigious University of Hartford Bent Award for Research, given to only one professor at the University each year, to recognize the quality and impact of their research on our understanding of the changing nature of business. Barney School senior Enoch Lenge not only won the Barney School Business Plan competition and the State of Connecticut competition, but also a national business plan competition for his innovation "green" packaging system.

College of Engineering, Technology, and Architecture Dean Lou Manzione



CETA experienced a number of major accomplishments over the past year. We had an exceptional recruiting year for students and we grew enrollment to record numbers. We attracted women, a group that is significantly under-represented in the engineering college population and in the profession at large. Twenty-one percent of the incoming class of 2011 was women, which is above the national average. We added three new tenure track faculty and one important non-tenure track in architecture. Dr. Patricia Mellodge joined the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department as an assistant professor this fall after completing her doctorate at Virginia Tech. Dr. Ying Yu joined the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department as an assistant professor after completing her doctoral work at Brown University. Ms. Michelle Vigeant joins our Acoustic Program in the Mechanical Engineering Department after she completes her doctorate at the University of Nebraska. While many major research universities and even Ivy League colleges struggle to hire women engineering faculty, CETA has just hired three outstanding women engineers! Dr. Ted Sawruck winner of a number of pedagogical grants and awards joined our Architecture Department as a non-tenure track associate professor. A \$1.3M grant from the World Bank, one of the largest grants awarded to CETA and the University was the result of several years of effort on the part of Associate Professor Saleh Keshawarz to make a positive impact on his native country. The grant helped to rebuild and strengthen the engineering programs at Herat University in Afghanistan. A new Chapter of Engineers without Borders (EWB) was formed this past year and received a generous grant from Pratt & Whitney, to plan the engineering design work to conduct a project to install solar powered water well pumps in and around a rural village south of New Delhi, India.

College of Education, Nursing and Health Professions— Dean Dorothy Zeiser

As the University of Hartford marked its 50th anniversary, there was plenty to celebrate in the College of Education, Nursing and Health Professions (ENHP) in 2006-2007. We are part of an educational community that provides students with outstanding professional training opportunities. Our college educates students to be professionals in service to the community. Our programs require students to participate in experiences in their chosen field while earning their college credits. The physical therapy program continues to excel as we transition into offering the doctorate of physical therapy. The on-campus clinic allows students to see an actual clinic in operation. Our radiography program is rapidly growing in enrollments as students seek this highly sought after career field. Students are placed in multiple clinical sites throughout the state. Nursing is flourishing with students interested to better themselves in their career choices. As we work to provide leaders in nursing, our students are being educated to work in management, educational and health care settings. Our educational leadership students have had excellent success in obtaining senior administration positions in school settings and higher education after graduating from our program. They

are pleased with the background we offer them. Education and human service students continue to gain knowledge and understanding of children and teaching at our on campus magnet school as well as in urban settings. Alumni are committed to their respective career fields and share their positive impression regarding the experiences they received while attending ENHP. We are working toward programs of excellence in 2007-2008 in the college and these experiences make us distinctive among our peers.



Voelker to Serve as Interim Provost

On June 1, 2007, College of Arts and Sciences Dean Joseph Voelker began serving as interim provost of the University when Provost Donna Randall left to begin her duties as the new president of Albion College. Joe came to the University in 2003 from Franklin & Marshall College in Pennsylvania, where he was Professor of English and associate dean of the faculty.

University of Hartford Magnet Schools—Dean's Report

Nothing exemplifies the University's motto, "a private University with a public purpose" as much as does the two Hartford magnet schools housed on University land. The University Magnet School (K-5) and the University High School of Science and Engineering are living works of the art of education, wherein talented faculty and staff challenge students of heterogeneous backgrounds to raise their sights and confidence. The results have made the University truly proud. The colleges of the University have offered opportunities to both faculty and students of the magnet schools to make use of campus expertise and facilities, and to the University's students as well to use the magnet schools as laboratories in which to grow in proficiency in their own fields, whether it be education, music and the arts, sports, or as volunteers with the students.



Building a sense of the community of many age groups and what they give to one another has resulted in such sharing as participation by University Magnet School students in the Martin Luther King commemorative service for the University community, the representation of the University High School of Science and Engineering to the Connecticut Legislature in its celebration of the passage of funding for magnet schools, and regional awards for the high school's *FIRST* Robotics team, which was mentored by members of the University's engineering college. Committed faculty members have included a Hartford Teacher of the Year in the High School. Visitors to the University Magnet School have included luminaries in politics and theater.

While the University Magnet School is well established in a building of great architectural character, the University High School of Science and Engineering has been meeting in temporary space in the Science building at the University's Asylum Avenue campus for the past three years. Ground has just been broken for a new building to meet the

dreams of both the City of Hartford and the University for a school in which students of talent in math and the sciences can be trained to fill the oft-expressed needs of science and engineering firms in the Hartford area.

Many students have already turned initial hopes into expectations for the future, and are successfully participating in college courses while simultaneously pursuing their high school curriculum.

Students at the University have been able to contribute a great deal to the growth and functioning of the two magnet schools. Civil Engineering students first identified the footprint on Mark Twain Drive that became the site upon which the new high school will be built. Similarly, students from the Civil Engineering Department have also acted as consultants (along with mentoring by professional engineers) to the University Magnet School in the redesign of its parking lots and minor flooding issues. Assuredly there will be further opportunities for mutual benefit, as each partner in this educational venture continues to develop awareness of the great potential that exists here.

Unique Alliance Brings Success for Robotics Team

A team composed of University High School students and American School for the Deaf (ASD) students won the Rookie All-Star Award in March 2007 at the Granite State Regional *FIRST* Robotics Competition in Manchester, N.H. The University High School/American School for the Deaf team was singled out for the Rookie All-Star Award at the regional competition in New Hampshire based largely on the remarkable alliance between the two schools, said Alan Hadad, associate vice president and dean of University magnet schools. It is believed to be the first combined team of deaf and hearing students to take part in the *FIRST* Robotics Competition.

Communication was a major issue for the 35 University High School students and 16 ASD students on the team, Hadad said. But with the help of sign language interpreters, the students learned to work so well together that they made it to the quarterfinals of the New Hampshire tournament, earning the Highest Rookie Seed Award in addition to the Rookie All-Star recognition.

Jarrold Moses '91 (AA'89 Hillyer)

Jarrold Moses has been a pioneer in using entertainment as a key marketing and communications vehicle. As founder of United Entertainment Group, he creates strategic partnerships and builds businesses for the marketing and entertainment industries, bridging the gap between Madison Avenue and Hollywood. He was responsible for crafting successful partnerships and programs for some of the world's largest corporations, including Procter and Gamble, Coca Cola, and the NBC and MTV networks. Moses' business projects are also philanthropic in nature. He served as entertainment consultant for The Gift of New York, a program developed for the families of 9/11. He is also cofounder of the New York Comedy Festival and its educational outreach program, Comedy in the Classroom.

Jeffrey Roseman '82 (AA'80 Hillyer)

When you watch the ball drop on New Year's Eve, you are seeing a very different Times Square than you saw 20 years ago. Retail real estate broker Jeffrey Roseman was one of the people most influential in transforming Times Square from a seedy eyesore to the vibrant commercial center it is today. She also became interested in electronic music and recorded multiple albums under the artistic name of "Madame Buddhafly." This all took place prior to her arrival at the University of Hartford. Her eclectic interests in music, moving image, design and interactivity were a natural fit for the Hartford Art School's Media Arts program. Since graduating summa cum laude, Ficca has served as associate professor, co-writer, and offline editor for Able Lives, a television series that received critical acclaim for its focus on people with disabilities. She is cofounder and art director for Towney Design, a creative Internet company in New Haven.

Dorothy Bosch Keller '62, MEd '63

Chair of the Department of Fine Arts and Performing Arts at Saint Joseph College, Dorothy Bosch Keller's knowledge and experience with art and culture virtually span the globe. Her ongoing studies and passion for the arts have taken her to Israel, Iran, Egypt, Syria, Turkey, Sweden, and Africa, to name just a few of her destinations. She worked on a number of important archeological sites and, in 1995, made a discovery of ancient tombs at the Ramesseum in Upper Egypt yielding burials, pottery, and other cultural artifacts. College of Engineering, Technology, and Architecture

Ryszard (Rich) Pryputniewicz '71

Rich Pryputniewicz is the K.G. Merriam Professor of Mechanical Engineering at Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) and founding director of its Center for Holographic Studies and Laser Micromechanics. He is also founding director of WPI's NanoEngineering, Science, and Technology program. Pryputniewicz's current research and teaching concentrate on theoretical and applied aspects of MEMS (microelectromechanical systems), smart sensors and structures, and in particular, nanotechnology, lasers, noninvasive metrology with nanometer accuracy on sub-micron scale, and nondestructive testing based on photonic methods. He has received numerous awards including the Teetor National Education Award from the Society of Manufacturing Engineers (SME) and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) International Award for outstanding contributions to the application of engineering mechanics to electronic and photonic packaging.

Lauren Zaccaro Larson '06

As a systems engineer at United Technologies' Hamilton Sundstrand Corp., Lauren Zaccaro Larson is now working on NASA's new Crew Exploration Vehicle (CEV). Her involvement with Sundstrand began as early as her sophomore year, however, when she was awarded a NASA Space Grant Industrial Fellowship to work on the design of test setups and procedures on small-machine noise control for the International Space Station. “Bright Ideas on Community Design: An Interactive Dialogue Workshop” was held in June 2007 and was the first phase of the Community Design Resource Project, a partnership of the University of Hartford’s Center for Integrated Design (CID) and the Capitol Region Council of Governments (CRCOG). The ultimate goal of the project is to develop promising strategies for advancing a livable communities design agenda in the Capitol Region. The project is supported by the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving. The workshop’s keynote speaker, Anton “Tony” Nelessen, has more than 37 years of professional experience as an urban designer, professor, author, and practitioner in the fields of visioning, physical planning, and urban design. University representatives include Nancy Wynn, assistant professor of visual communication design at the Hartford Art School, Terri Albert and Jeff Cohen of the Barney School of Business; and Jim Fuller, David Pines, and Terri Hahn of the College of Engineering, Technology, and Architecture (CETA). The University’s Center for Integrated Design provides local communities with resources and solutions that address architectural, engineering, business, and visual communication design issues.

More Than 2,000 Came to Campus for Community Day

Thousands of people filled the campus on April 14, 2007 for the University’s largest ever Community Day. In honor of the University’s 50th anniversary, this year’s Community Day took participants back to the era of the University’s founding, with such 1950s-themed attractions as an arcade and ice cream shop, hula



hoops, a Nifty ‘50s Car Display, and a Tribute to Elvis. Other events that day included The return of The Hartt Steelband, circus demonstrations, “Be an Anchor” experience at the University’s television studio; a “bounce house,” face painting, and other amusements for children; and a youth soccer clinic. Other attractions included book sign-

ings, robot demonstrations, Project Horizon interactive health and wellness displays, and opportunities for children to get hands-on exposure to musical instruments. New attractions this year included an 18-hole miniature golf course in Mortensen Library. In addition,



in honor of the Bard’s April 23 birthday, more than 100 people recited sonnets in a three-hour Shakespeare Sonnet Marathon, organized by The President’s College. Community Day 2007 offered something for everyone.



NEW AND IMPROVED FACILITIES

2006-2007



Completed **Alumni Plaza**, the new plaza between Hawk Hall, the University Commons, and the pedestrian bridge – which has created an attractive gateway to the residential side of campus and a new gathering spot for students. The oval-shaped plaza is constructed out of concrete of various colors and finishes, with sitting walls along the perimeter.



Opened the Hartford Art School's **Renée Samuels Center**, a striking new 15,000-square-foot, two-story addition to the art school which houses two growing programs – photography and media arts. The \$5 million project included the expansion and renovation of space in Taub Hall for the painting and drawing department, the printmaking department, and the foundation studies program.



Completed the University's newest residence hall, **Hawk Hall** – a five-story building that will house over 200 first-year students. The new facility, the largest residence hall construction since completion of the Park River apartments in 1989, includes classroom and multi-purpose space on the first floor, and lounges with floor-to-ceiling windows and spectacular views on the residential floors.



Began construction of the \$21 million main building of the University's new Performing Arts Complex – the 55,000-square-foot **Mort and Irma Handel Performing Arts Center**. Scheduled to open in the fall of 2008. The complex will provide additional space for The Hart School's Theatre and Dance Divisions and community programs.

Renovated **East Hall**, resulting in state-of-the-art classrooms and laboratory facilities for the College of Arts and Science's undergraduate and graduate students in psychology. The Graduate Institute of Professional Psychology, which had been located in Hartford, moved into its new home in East Hall.

Completed renovation of the **Hawk's Nest**, and the addition of an elevator in the University Commons.



Completed major renovations of **A-Complex and C-Complex**. These two complexes received the same kinds of extensive renovations that B-Complex and D-Complex underwent last summer. The work includes a complete overhaul of the bathrooms, new heating and air conditioning units, aesthetic improvements, and a change in layout that will result in 48 new beds.



Completed Phase I of the **Home Field Advantage** project for athletics, including the renovation of the existing soccer and lacrosse field (Al-Marzook Field), the relocation and construction of the softball field, and the construction of a baseball field, press boxes, and bleachers. The successful \$6.8 million campaign for these facilities earned the University a \$700,000 grant from the prestigious Kresge Foundation.

NCAA Honors Four Hartford Teams

The University of Hartford had four teams honored by the NCAA in May 2007, as part of more than 800 Division I sports teams to receive public recognition awards for their latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores.

Baseball, softball, men's indoor track, and men's outdoor track all posted multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports. The public recognition awards are part of the broad Division I academic reform effort.

The 839 teams receiving awards this year represent 217 Division I colleges and universities, or two-thirds of the 326 institutions that compete in NCAA Division I athletics. High-performing teams receiving awards posted APR scores ranging from 975 to a perfect 1,000, said NCAA President Myles Brand.

"These teams prove once again that student-athletes are students first, and many of them are excellent students," Brand said. "I want to personally congratulate these teams and their student-athletes who are working hard in their sport and in the classroom and setting a great example for all students."

In Memoriam—Remembering our University Community Members

David Baldyga '59

Baldyga, alumnus and retired faculty member of Ward College, died Aug. 2007 at the age of 68. Graduated from Ward College of Technology in 1959, was an assistant professor of engineering technology at the school for 15 years before retiring from the University in 2001. "Dave was a fine teacher who passionately cared about students and did whatever was needed to help them do well in his classes," said Walter Banzhaf, professor emeritus of the College of Engineering, Technology, and Architecture, who chaired the search committee that hired Baldyga in 1987. A registered professional engineer, Baldyga designed the first remote control system for television transmitters, and created many other broadcasting innovations. Banzhaf said that "all who knew Dave, including colleagues and students, liked him, respected his technical knowledge, and will miss him."

Richard A. Cohn

Cohn, 60, of West Hartford, died in October 2006 of complications from leukemia. Richard was born in Chicago and grew up in Sacramento, CA. He received a bachelor's degree from Harvard University, 1969 and an M.B.A. from Stanford University, 1972, where he also did his doctoral work. He taught finance at M.I.T. and the Universities of Illinois and British Columbia. In 2004, he retired from his teaching career after 19 years as professor of finance at the University of Hartford where he received the distinguished Bent Award for Scholarly Creativity. Richard will be remembered for his innovative research in finance and in particular, for his work on the murky mysteries of the stock market, specifically a set of papers that he co-wrote with his colleague Franco Modigliani, winner of the Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences in 1985.

George Michael Evica

Evica, associate professor emeritus of English, died Nov. 2007 following a courageous battle with lung and brain cancer. He was 79. Evica began teaching at the University in 1964 and retired in 1992. He received national and international recognition for his research on the life and assassination of John F. Kennedy. He was the author of two books, *And We Are All Mortal: New Evidence and Analysis in the Assassination of John F. Kennedy*, published in 1978, and *A Certain Arrogance: U.S. Intelligence's Manipulation of Religious Groups and Individuals in Two World Wars and the Cold War—and the Sacrificing of Lee Harvey Oswald*. *A Certain Arrogance*, published just last year, was based on six years of research and writing. Evica argued that American intelligence – the OSS and the CIA – misused major religious groups and individuals through two world wars and the Cold War, focusing on the creation of the Albert Schweitzer College in Switzerland and its ties to Lee Harvey Oswald. In 1975, Evica began broadcasting "Assassination Journal" on WWUH (91.3 FM) live each Tuesday, up until this illness forced him to stop.

Dorothy Lenhart Fidler



West Hartford, she was born into a musically talented family April 7, 1917 in Terre Haute, IN. A graduate of Indiana State with further musical studies at Juilliard and Eastman, her major teachers were Luigi Silva, Bernard Parronchi and Marcel Hubert. By age 11, the press considered her the finest, youngest cellist in Indiana. By age 14, she was a member of the Terre Haute Symphony, the musician's union having waived the age requirement to allow her to play. Throughout high school her trio played daily on radio station WBOW. In 1939, she married violinist Willfred S. Fidler.

William F. Gonillo '84

Bill Gonillo, News 12 Connecticut sports director and a 1984 graduate of the University of Hartford, died Sept. 2007, at his Woodbridge home. He was 44 years old. Bill was the sports director at News 12 Connecticut, based in Norwalk, for more than a decade. Prior to News 12, he worked at WELI radio where he was the voice of Yale University sports and was a pre-game and post-game host for Hartford Whalers hockey and Boston Celtics basketball. He also worked at WWIT, Channel 30. The only announcer in Connecticut broadcast history to win the AP "Broadcast of the Year" award for both radio and television, Gonillo also received numerous awards from organizations including the Connecticut Association of Athletic Directors and the Walter Camp Football Foundation. According to the New Haven Register, Gonillo covered virtually every major event in Connecticut sports since the late 1980s, usually doing his own camera work while conducting an interview at the same time.



Justin Potter, Student

Potter died from injuries sustained in a car accident in October 2006. Justin, 19, was a sophomore in the Interactive Information Technology program. Justin had gone home to Newtown, Conn., to watch his younger brother play in a football game. He died when the vehicle he was driving struck a tree. A 2005 graduate of Newtown High School, Justin was passionate about computers and designing Websites, and he loved coming home to cheer on his brother at football games.

In Memoriam—Remembering our University Community Members

University Life Regent Dorothy Goodwin



Goodwin, life regent of the University and beloved state legislator known for her commitment to education, died June 2007, at the age of 92. A long-time trustee of

Hartford College for Women (HCW), Goodwin was elected to the University's Board of Regents in 1972 and was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws by the University in 1982. She became a life regent in 1996. In 1993, Goodwin received the Laura Johnson Woman of the Year Award, named after the first president of Hartford College for Women. Goodwin, who was inducted into the Connecticut Women's Hall of Fame in 1994, also had a deep connection to the University of Connecticut having served as an associate professor of economics, assistant provost and director of Institutional Research. "Dorothy Goodwin was a model leader and citizen of Connecticut. Her dedication to education through the University of Connecticut, Hartford College for Women, and the University of Hartford and her longtime enthusiasm for the education of women for leadership roles in society stand as testimony to her great life," said President Walter Harrison. "Dorothy's faith in the future will forever be entwined with the University of Hartford's mission of educating women leaders for tomorrow." Goodwin became a political leader in 1975 at the age of 60 when she was elected to the state legislature, representing Connecticut's 54th Assembly District (Storrs - Mansfield). Goodwin said her greatest accomplishment was the school equalization bill. As chair of the House Education Committee, Goodwin helped redesign the state's school funding formula to give every town a grant commensurate with its need. Dorothy Goodwin was born in Hartford, Sept. 2, 1914, one of five children of Charles Archibald Goodwin and Ruth Cheney Goodwin. Two Hartford landmarks - The Bushnell and Goodwin Park - were named for her grandfathers, Horace Bushnell and the Rev. Francis Goodwin.

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Ed Matesky

Matesky, who headed media relations at the University for more than 25 years, died Aug. 2007 at his home in Madison, Conn., at the age of 76. Formerly the award-winning chief education writer for The Hartford Times, Edwin Matesky joined the University in 1970, when Archibald Woodruff was president, and continued under administrations headed by Presidents Stephen Joel Trachtenberg and Humphrey Tonkin. "The University is a community with several thousand people living and working here," he told The Informer, the student paper, on his retirement in 1996. It was the job of (what was then called) the University's News Bureau, he said, to cover that community "the same way a local newspaper covers a city." Among the most notable University stories receiving national attention under Matesky's direction was a custard pie fight in 1972 between Woodruff and student leader Eric Litsky that was covered by LIFE magazine, and the awarding of an honorary degree to comedian George Burns in 1988. Matesky's story, which included Burns' quote that "Now I can run home and tell my mother I'm a doctor," was carried across the country.



Gordon Clark Ramsey

Ramsey, who served the University for more than 20 years as an adjunct faculty member, secretary to the Faculty Senate, and executive secretary of the Emeriti Association, passed away in June 2007 at the age of 66. "Gordon was one of the University's great characters. Once you met him, you would never forget him," said President Walter Harrison. "But he also added immeasurably to the character of the University. His dedication to the faculty through his service as secretary to the Faculty Senate; to the emeriti faculty, through his similar service to that body; and above all to his students, made this University a far, far better place."



John Roderick

Roderick, a professor of English at Hillyer College and faculty member in the School of Communication, taught at the University for 26 years, died in Aug. 2007 at the age of 63, following a courageous battle with leukemia. Roderick was an extraordinary teacher, known for his patience and skill in turning students into confident writers. A gifted writer, poet, and experienced journalist, he served as chair of Hillyer's English Department from 1998 to 2006. In 1996, Roderick was recognized with two prestigious honors, both in the same year. He received the University's Roy E. Larsen Award for Excellence in Teaching and was named Connecticut Professor of the Year by the national Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE).

In Memoriam—Remembering our University Community Members

Winthrop W. Sanderson

Sanderson served as the University of Hartford's director of Physical Plant from 1965 to 1980, died in September 2006 at the age of 91. Sanderson was remembered by colleagues for his dedication to the University and for playing an instrumental role in the design of the campus. Sanderson was born on April 11, 1915, in Whately, Mass. He was a veteran of World War II, enlisting in the U. S. Army one day after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. He served as tank commander in the 27th Tank Battalion, 20th Armor Division, Company B and was awarded the Bronze Star for action in Donauworth, Germany. Sanderson was appointed the military governor of Traunstein, Germany, achieving the rank of captain. His unit was involved in the liberation of the Dachau concentration camp. Before working at the University of Hartford, Sanderson served as the director of Physical Plant from 1964 to 1965 at the University of Tampa and as physical plant administrator from 1946 to 1964 at the Northfield and Mount Herman Schools in Northfield, Mass.

Linda Snyder '96

Snyder, who served as assistant to the vice president for finance and administration from 1991-96, died in Feb. 2007 after a long illness. She was 63. Snyder was a resident of Manchester, Conn., and a 1996 graduate of the Barney School of Business. Throughout most of her career, she worked in the field of education as an executive assistant. In addition to working at the University of Hartford, Snyder had been employed by the State Department of Education, Project Concern, and the University of Connecticut. Snyder was a member of Temple Beth Shalom for the past 40 years, served on its board of directors and was an active member of its sisterhood. She was a past-president of the Tobacco Valley Chapter of Women's American ORT, a member of the Hebrew Home and Hospital Auxiliary and a member of Professional Secretaries International.

Dr. Irving S. Starr

Starr served as dean of the University of Hartford's College of Education during its first 25 years, died Nov. 2007 in Hartford. He was 88. Starr became dean of the College of Education (now the College of Education, Nursing and Health Professions) when the University was formed in 1957, and he continued in that capacity until his retirement in 1982. During his tenure as dean, he played a significant role in the growth and development of the University and its education programs. Among other things, Starr was known for securing many grants to support programs in the College of Education, and for creating strong ties between the College and the Hartford Public Schools and played a major role in shaping the academic direction of both the College of Education and the University during its first 25 years. Irene, his wife of 62 years, considers the University of Hartford to be their fourth child because of Irving's love and dedication to the University.

Painter and Former HAS Director Alan Tompkins

Tompkins' death on Thanksgiving morning 2007 came just three weeks after his 100th birthday on Oct. 29. Tompkins was director of the Hartford Art School (HAS) in 1957 when it merged with the Hartt College of Music and Hillyer College to form the University of Hartford. Tompkins designed the new University's official seal. He served as HAS director until 1969 and then taught art history and visual studies until his retirement in 1974. Despite his distinguished career as an educator, Tompkins wanted to be known first and foremost as a painter. In a career that spans almost a full century, Tompkins painted thousands of works, including many in private collections and one that hangs in the New Britain Museum of American Art. "Alan Tompkins was a giant – as an educator, as an artist, and as an administrator," said University President Walter Harrison. "He led the Hartford Art School when it became one of the founding schools of the University of Hartford, and he helped form its distinctive blend of education in the arts and in the liberal arts." Tompkins credited his early study of art history at Columbia University in the 1920s with preparing him for the art movements of his day, including cubism, surrealism, abstract, and pop art. He graduated from Yale with a BFA and was awarded commissions from the U.S. Treasury Department's Art Project for Post Office murals. He also taught at Cooper Union Art School and Columbia, and worked as a book illustrator, muralist, portraitist, and industrial designer. One of his murals hangs in the Central Baptist Church in Hartford.

Women's Education and Leadership Fund

WELFund is a legacy of Hartford College for Women, which began providing grants to faculty, staff, and students this year who propose new initiatives in support of women's education and women's issues across the University. Below are some examples of the programs this year.

Support for returning adult women students: In the spirit of the Academic Express program, we've committed to providing scholarships to three women per year in the Bachelor of University Studies program (a degree completion program with a majority of women participants). The three women we are supporting presently are all high-achieving, local women who face significant financial challenges to completing their degrees.

Engaging the community in issues of relevance and interest to women: A recent educational symposium honoring the 35th anniversary of the Title IX legislation was organized by Jane Barstow, Professor of English, and brought together students, coaches, teachers and administrators of 12 area high schools and 6 area colleges and universities. We hosted a national and international cadre of visitors from New England and beyond in thinking about women as peace-builders. We were honored to have Mims Butterworth, a legendary peace-builder, present opening remarks.

Promoting scholarship that shines a spotlight on women's lives: WELFund dollars are making it possible for faculty and students to collaboratively pursue research topics of particular interest to women and girls. Examples include Professor Jilda Aliotta's book-in-progress about the first woman judge in Massachusetts, Professor Susan Coleman's article exploring women in the finance industry, and anticipated genetic research on breast cancer.

Empowering women students to leadership on campus and beyond: Alex Symmonds' organization of "SWEET Day" is only one example of the exceptional projects being created and completed by University students. Women students are seeking support for out-of-class leadership development opportunities. In particular, several students in sciences and engineering have been able to participate in summer research with one-on-one mentoring by faculty members.




Paying Tribute to Jewish War Veterans

The Class of 2011 Has Arrived!

The University welcomed more than 1,500 freshmen and thousands of returning students to campus, in the annual late-summer ritual known as Move-In Weekend. More than 200 freshmen moved into the brand new Hawk Hall, the University's first new residence hall since the completion of the Park River apartments in 1989. Returning students found that the residential side of campus looks quite different than it did when they left for the summer. In addition to the five-story, brick and glass Hawk Hall, the residential side of campus has been reshaped by the completion of Alumni Plaza, the attractive new gathering area between Hawk Hall and University Commons that will serve as a center of student life. The University also completed major renovations this summer in A-Complex and C-Complex, two of the University's oldest residential facilities. The incoming freshman class of 2011 is made up of 1,533 students, including 735 men and 798 women and includes 42 international students representing 17 countries, and the percentage of minority students increased to 26.8 percent, up from 22.3 percent last year.

Average "Out of Pocket" Student Expenses

Over 90% of University of Hartford students receive a scholarship or grant from the University.
